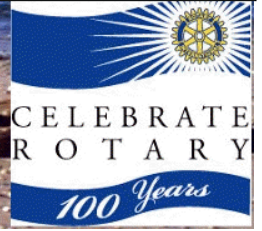

As the club agenda was being shuffled around waiting for the arrival of Everett Hawks owner Sam Adams, some of us noticed program sponsor **Fred Safstrom** furiously writing either a letter or a short novel. As it turned out, Fred had to call the absent Mr. Adams, who either forgot his speaking engagement or had something better to do.

To his credit, Fred did an admirable job of extemporaneously giving the scheduled program. Owned by Sam Adams (current All Pro Defensive Tackle for the NFL Buffalo Bills) and coached by Jay Atwood (previously coached minor league football in the NWFL), the **Everett Hawks** organization has completed terms to play indoor football games in the Everett Events Center. The team will play against other teams from the Tri-Cities, Florida, Georgia, Idaho, Montana, New Jersey, Ohio and Wyoming. The regular season is followed by a 3 game playoff tournament with the pinnacle achievement of the National Indoor Football Championship.

"We always expected this venue to have at least 2 permanent tenants," remarked the Executive Director for the Everett Public Facilities District. *"We are very pleased with the Hawks' strong local identities and welcome them to the Everett Events Center."*

Are you a member of a Rotary club, or are you a Rotarian? I can remember when I realized the difference of the two concepts and made the life-enhancing transition of becoming a Rotarian.

I was fairly new to the Rotary club of Everett. I was vacationing in the small seashore town of Puerto Escondido, Mexico. I'd decided to attempt the adventure of a Rotary make-up and asked around about the nearest Rotary club. I discovered the town did feature a small Rotary club of 9 members, all ordinary businessmen in the community. The club president's wife made contact with me and introduced herself as "Mrs. President." I quickly became aware that Rotary is regarded as very prestigious outside the USA. She took me to see a school in her city that was in dire need of supplies. This school had a mud floor, corrugated tin roof, and an outdoor lavatory. I was literally speechless when I saw those happy students and observed their needs. The Rotary Club of Puerto Escondido had physically

built this school with materials purchased from the financial assistance of the Rotary Club of Yakima, WA. Now, they needed supplies.

I attended the Rotary club meeting that evening and heard how this club was planning a local fundraiser to pay for books and small supplies for the school. What really surprised me was the discovery that this small Rotary club was also sending money and clothes to a Rotary club in San Salvador that was coping with a recent disaster.

This was the moment that I began to comprehend the real depth of the Rotary organization and the true meaning of being a Rotarian.

The path for developing from club member to Rotarian simply requires a small effort in getting involved with club activities, doing make-ups, attending District functions, and practicing "service above self." That effort will reveal to you how this prestigious Rotary organization is comprised of ordinary people constantly doing extraordinary things.

Everett Events Center's Marketing and Sales Department will assist in marketing and sales efforts for the new franchise.

"We looked at the experience and enthusiasm of the Everett Events Center's Marketing & Sales Department and realized how great of an asset they could become," commented Lisa Balmes, VP, Operations/Business Development for the Everett Hawks. "They have done a great job on the marketing and sales of the events as well as sponsorship sales, but most importantly they have entrenched themselves into the local community. That is our goal as well."

"Everett is a strong sports market with minor league baseball and junior hockey," NIFL President Carolyn Shiver recently said. "With a sports base already in place, we expect the Everett market to respond well and support our brand of indoor football." The NIFL will begin its fifth year of operation in 2005. The league currently has 26 member teams across the United States.

The Everett Hawks is an organization that is funded by private investors and corporate sponsors. Corporate sponsorships will include advertising for organizations, community awareness, game day tickets and the opportunity to be involved with an organization dedicated to making Everett a great place to live.

Season tickets will range from \$49-\$231 per seat.

The goal of the league is to give athletes the chance to showcase their talents and earn an opportunity to play at the next level, whether that is college or professionally. The Hawks are currently seeking players with a winning attitude. The Hawks and their families expect to be deeply entrenched in community activities. The owners, coaches, players and administration staff will be visiting schools, Boys and Girls Clubs, children's hospitals, as well as many other local charitable organizations. The Hawks currently have internship opportunities for local college and high school students.

"Our goal is to provide the community a fun family activity during the months of March-July that is reasonably priced," Adams previously said.
